Dear Acting Inspector General Brzymialkiewicz:

We write to request an investigation into whether Dr. Jenifer Chatfield, the Deputy Assistant Secretary for Fish and Wildlife and Parks, has violated federal ethics rules and/or federal law. Specifically, she may have participated in particular matters involving specific parties with whom she has a covered relationship and may have provided inaccurate information about her background to the Department of the Interior's (DOI) Departmental Ethics Office. Rather than making decisions as a high-ranking official in the interest of the American people, she appears to be involving herself in decisions that would directly benefit her family business and those of her allies. Many of those decisions would normally be made by agency experts far below her in the organizational chart. DOI has either refused to release her ethics guidance or has not provided her with any, despite multiple potential conflicts of interest. This letter contains highly sensitive and detailed information. We request that you treat redacted content accordingly.

DR. CHATFIELD

Dr. Jenifer Chatfield was appointed as a Senior Advisor at the Department of the Interior (DOI) on May 12, 2025,¹ and then promoted to Deputy Assistant Secretary for Fish and Wildlife and Parks, though DOI did not publicize either appointment. On March 9, 2026, a DOI press release quoted Dr. Chatfield as the Deputy Assistant Secretary for Fish and Wildlife and Parks, a position that helps to oversee the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the National Park Service but does not require Senate confirmation.²

Dr. Chatfield is a board-certified veterinarian³ with deep connections to the captive-bred wildlife industry, including previous work in veterinary practice at zoos and captive-bred wildlife

facilities.⁴ In 2018, during the first Trump administration, Dr. Chatfield was appointed to the International Wildlife Conservation Council, an advisory board tasked with making recommendations to then-Secretary Ryan Zinke about removing barriers to the importation into the United States of legally hunted wildlife.⁵ Members of the council largely represented trophy hunting and gun rights interests aligned with then-Secretary Zinke’s efforts to reverse restrictions on importation of trophies.⁶ As a council member, Dr. Chatfield was assigned to represent wildlife and habitat conservation/management organizations.⁷

Dr. Chatfield’s family is heavily involved in the trade and breeding of endangered wildlife. They own and manage a FWS-permitted captive-bred wildlife facility in Dade City, Florida, known as “4J Conservation Center.” The name of the company, “4J,” appears to stand for the four family members’ first names – all of which start with the letter J (John Chatfield, Jeri Chatfield, Jason Chatfield, and Jenifer Chatfield).⁸ Each of the family members are officers in the business; John Chatfield is identified as the registered agent, incorporator, and president of 4J Conservation Center in documents filed with the Florida Division of Corporations.⁹ The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) licensed the 4J Conservation Center as a Class A breeding facility, which are authorized to breed and raise animals in a controlled environment.¹⁰

Dr. Chatfield’s father, John Chatfield is a founding member of the Zoological Association of America (ZAA),¹¹ which provides more flexible accreditation to zoos, aquariums, and other facilities that house captive wild animals and do not meet the more rigorous standards of the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA). John Chatfield has a history of engaging in the exotic wildlife trade and has participated in the sale of animals to game ranches that facilitate canned hunts.¹² Cited by the Department of Agriculture for unsafe and unsanitary conditions, an animal rights group described the 4J facility as “a puppy mill for lemurs.”¹³ In 2013, 4J Conservation Center was cited by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission for

improperly securing kangaroos after one escaped and was killed by law enforcement personnel.¹⁴ Mr. Chatfield was unable to say how many animals he had on the premises, though he did admit that the kangaroo in question was one of his animals. According to the state’s report, Mr. Chatfield initially denied that the kangaroo was his, but later accepted responsibility after the fish and wildlife inspector proposed DNA testing. Florida officials did not cite Jenifer Chatfield, then a part-owner of the facility, though she was present at the time of the incident.¹⁵

FEDERAL ETHICS RULES

Federal ethics rules require executive branch employees to avoid participating in matters in which their impartiality could reasonably be questioned or in which they have a covered relationship, absent written authorization.¹⁶ The Standards of Ethical Conduct for Employees of the Executive Branch establish general principles requiring that (1) federal employees act impartially and not give preferential treatment to any private organization or individual, (2) endeavor to avoid any actions that create the appearance that they are violating the law or federal ethical standards, and (3) shall not use their public office for private gain.¹⁷ Whether an employee’s actions and particular circumstances create an appearance of legal or ethical violations is “determined from the perspective of a reasonable person with knowledge of the relevant facts.”¹⁸

The requirement that agency employees obtain specific authorization before participating in matters in which their impartiality is likely to be questioned applies to “particular matters involving specific parties,” such as contracts, grants, or investigations.¹⁹ This standard includes matters in which persons or entities with whom the employee has a “covered relationships.”²⁰ Those covered relationships include persons or entities with whom the employee has or seeks a business, contractual, or other financial relationship that involves more than a routine consumer transaction; members of the employee’s household, or relatives with whom the employee has a close personal relationship; persons or entities for whom the employee’s spouse, parent, or child serves or seeks to serve as an officer, director, trustee, general partner, agent, attorney, consultant, contractor, or employee; persons or entities for whom the employee has within the last year served in those same capacities; and organizations in which the employee is an active participant.²¹

Federal employees must take steps to avoid appearance of loss of impartiality in the performance of official duties and should not participate in particular matters involving specific parties if the

employee knows that they have a covered relationship with a party in such matter.²² Separately, federal employees are barred from participating personally and substantially in any matter in which there is a known financial interest in an organization in which they previously served as an officer, director, employee, general partner, or trustee.²³ DOI employees are required to recuse from such matters in order to avoid financial conflicts of interest, which have criminal penalties under 18 U.S.C. § 208. If Dr. Chatfield is aware that her impartiality could be questioned based on previous experience and close connections with parties engaged in business before DOI, it would be prudent for her to consult with DOI's Office of Ethics before taking any official action in a particular matter.

DR. CHATFIELD'S ETHICS DISCLOSURES AND INCONSISTENCIES

The available record provides no indication that Dr. Chatfield recused from certain policy areas or particular matters in which she has covered relationships or a vested interest. On February 13, 2026, the DOI Office of Ethics responded to an Office of Government Ethics (OGE) Form 201 request from the Committee on Natural Resources staff by producing only Dr. Chatfield's public financial disclosure report, known as OGE Form 278e.²⁴ No written guidance about how Dr. Chatfield would manage potential conflicts of interest was provided. Committee staff then contacted the DOI Office of Congressional and Legislative Affairs to afford them an additional opportunity to provide any other ethics documents if they exist. No additional ethics documentation was provided, suggesting that the DOI Office of Ethics failed to conduct an ethical review of Dr. Chatfield's recusal obligations when she joined the federal government or DOI is withholding public ethics documents. The high-ranking nature of the position and potential conflicts involved should have prompted additional ethics reviews and filings, including an ethics agreement.

Furthermore, the financial disclosure report provided to the Committee appears to contain inconsistencies. Her OGE Form 278e, signed on May 30, 2025, states that her position as Owner of Twin Doc Media, Inc., ended in April 2025. However, the Florida Division of Corporations lists Dr. Chatfield as the current registered agent for Twin Doc Media, Inc and the company status as active as of April 6, 2026.²⁵ The most recent annual report, which was filed on March 24, 2025, also lists Dr. Chatfield as the current registered agent and officer/director.²⁶

More concerning, Dr. Chatfield's OGE 278e discloses that she was director of 4J Conservation Center, Inc., from October 2007 to December 2023. However, according to documents from the

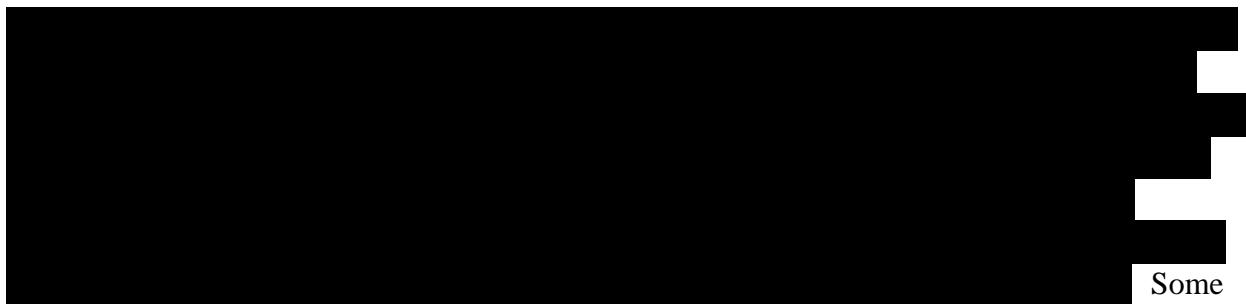

State of Florida, she served as an officer or director for 4J Conservation Center, Inc., until May 5, 2025.²⁷ 4J Conservation Center’s 2025 annual report filed with the Florida Division of Corporations on April 7, 2025, lists Dr. Chatfield as an officer.²⁸ It was not until May 5, 2025, when an amended annual report was filed with the State of Florida, that Dr. Chatfield was removed from the listed officers. Those listed on the amended report include her father, mother, and twin brother.²⁹

On her OGE Form 278e, Dr. Chatfield did not declare any financial interests in 4J Conservation Center. However, she did declare business/consulting fee income of \$77,907 as the sole proprietor of “Jenifer Chatfield, DVM, DACZM, FACVPM,” a position she has held from April 2024 to the “present.”³⁰ The total value of that asset was estimated between \$100,000 to \$250,000 from April 2024 to May 2025.³¹ While the OGE Form 278e does not include a list of clients, in an ongoing 4J Conservation Center permit application dated October 26, 2024, Dr. Chatfield was listed as the veterinarian on staff.³² If she was indeed the veterinarian associated with 4J Conservation Center, the business/consulting fee income listed on her OGE Form 278e may have come, at least in part, from work associated with 4J Conservation Center. If Dr. Chatfield’s income was derived, even in part, from work associated with 4J Conservation Center, she may have violated 5 C.F.R. § 2635, which requires former employees to undergo a two-year period of recusal from participating in particular matters in which the former employer is a party.³³

ENGAGEMENT ON ISSUES WITH A POTENTIAL CONFLICT OF INTEREST



Some of the issues in Dr. Chatfield’s portfolio may represent engagement on policy issues from which

she should have recused herself from once she began her new post within the federal government. Given the appearance of her family and former employer interest in deregulatory actions and increased permitting flexibility for ESA issues including import, export, and captive breeding of endangered species, we recommend that the OIG consider a broad range of actions that Dr. Chatfield has taken during her tenure at DOI, including but not limited to those detailed in the following sections.

4J Conservation Center Permit

On September 9, 2025, FWS posted public notice of “Foreign Endangered Species; Receipt of Permit Applications,” in which the agency noticed receipt of permit “applications to conduct certain activities with foreign species listed as endangered under the Endangered Species Act” and requested public comments on the permits therein.³⁴ Included was a five-year permit renewal request from 4J Conservation Center, which sought a captive-bred wildlife registration under 50 CFR 17.21(g) for black-and-white ruffed lemur and red-ruffed lemur “to enhance the propagation or survival of the species.”³⁵ The documents associated with the permit request include application materials and supporting documents. In Appendix II of the 4J application, “Dr. Jennifer [sic] Chatfield, Veterinarian” is listed as a staff member at the facility with “20 years of experience caring for and providing veterinary care for both black & white ruffed lemurs and red ruffed lemurs.”³⁶ Her curriculum vitae (CV) is included in the application documents. Notably the CV did not include 4J Conservation Center as part of Dr. Chatfield’s professional experience.³⁷

Supporting documents associated with the application include email correspondence between 4J representative Jeff Holland, a representative of the Zoo & Wildlife Consulting Corporation and the listed primary contact for 4J Conservation Center, and Fish and Wildlife Service staff. According to the supporting documents attached to 4J’s permit application, email communications about the permit application began on February 26, 2025, and extended through June 3, 2025, more than 20 days after Dr. Chatfield’s appointment at DOI.³⁸ 4J’s receipt of permit application was posted in the Federal Register on September 9, 2025, well after Dr. Chatfield had begun her tenure at DOI. No amendments to the application regarding Dr. Chatfield’s involvement in 4J Conservation Center appear to have been filed during that time. If Dr. Chatfield’s disclosed period of service at 4J Conservation Center is accurate on her federal ethics paperwork, then the application materials associated with 4J Conservation Center’s permit

are inaccurate. If not, it appears that Dr. Chatfield may have obscured her involvement with a party seeking a permit from the agency in which she now has a leadership position.

Under 5 C.F.R. § 2635, Dr. Chatfield should have obtained specific authorization before participating in particular matters – like the 4J Conservation Center permit – that implicated her covered relationships. 4J Conservation Center is not just Dr. Chatfield’s former employer; the permit applicants are Dr. Chatfield’s parents and twin brother. If the paperwork filed with the Florida Divisions of Corporations is accurate, then the relationship is also covered under ethics laws because Dr. Chatfield served as an officer with 4J Conservation Center within a year prior to the beginning of her tenure with DOI. Accordingly, Dr. Chatfield’s relationship with 4J Conservation Center should have been identified by the DOI Office of Ethics as a covered relationship and required Dr. Chatfield’s immediate recusal from subject matter areas implicating her family’s business and former employer.

Given Dr. Chatfield's previous work and interest in [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] may implicate additional ethical guidance governing personal and business relationships. 5 C.F.R § 2635.502(a)(3) advises that federal employees who are concerned that circumstances beyond the specific covered relationship categories would raise questions regarding their impartiality may determine whether they should not participate in a particular matter.⁴⁷ The OIG may consider whether Dr. Chatfield exercised her judgement to recuse from matters in which there is a risk of perceived partiality.

POTENTIAL VIOLATIONS OF ETHICS RULES AND FEDERAL LAW

In the absence of any further documents relevant to her ethics posture, Dr. Chatfield's involvement in policy issues [REDACTED] [REDACTED] as well as potential direct involvement in particular matters involving specific parties with whom she has covered relationships may represent violations of 5 C.F.R. § 2635 and/or 18 U.S.C. § 208. Under 5 C.F.R. § 2635.503, an employee who has received a covered payment from a former employer is subject, in the absence of a waiver, to a two-year period of recusal from participating in particular matters in which that former employer is engaged or represents a party.⁴⁸ Additionally, Dr. Chatfield may not have properly exercised her judgement under 5 C.F.R. § 2635.502(a)(3) to consider partiality questions and recuse from matters in which there is perceived partiality.

Under 18 U.S.C. § 208, executive branch employees are prohibited from participating personally and substantially in a particular government matter that will affect their own financial interests, as well as the financial interests of certain individuals with whom they have ties outside the government.⁴⁹ Federal employees are barred from working on assignments in which there is a known financial interest in an organization in which they previously served as an officer, director, employee, general partner, or trustee.⁵⁰ DOI employees are required to recuse from such matters in order to avoid financial conflicts of interest, which have criminal penalties under 18 U.S.C. § 208. If Dr. Chatfield has retained any financial interest in 4J Conservation Center, Inc., then her involvement in decisions related to the permit could represent a violation of 18 U.S.C. § 208.

Dr. Chatfield may have also violated the APA and the ESA through her efforts to circumvent statutory processes associated with FWS rulemaking and permitting. The inconsistencies in Dr. Chatfield's OGE 278e may also point to a violation of 18 U.S.C. § 1001 if those inconsistencies indicate that she made false statements to the DOI Ethics Office. DOI's refusal to provide the Committee or the public any of Dr. Chatfield's ethics documentation outside of her initial disclosures raises questions about what is being hidden.

Dr. Chatfield's engagement in policy areas in which she has a vested interest, [REDACTED] raises significant concerns about her ethical conduct at DOI. These actions are especially grave [REDACTED] amid the Trump administration's permissive approach to potential conflicts of interest. Dr. Chatfield's potential ethical lapses undermine public confidence that federal regulators are acting in the public interest, without bias for those in their personal lives.
