Dear Ranking Member Grijalva:

Thank you for your letter of November 3, 2017, regarding the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Final Report Pursuant to Executive Order 13783 on Promoting Energy Independence and Economic Growth (report).

I appreciate your concerns. The Bureau of Land Management Public Land Order withdrew public and National Forest System lands in the Grand Canyon watershed from location and entry under the Mining Law of 1872 for a period of 20 years, subject to valid existing rights. This recommendation was listed 13th out of 15 recommended actions.

I also appreciate the numerous reasons you listed for the mineral withdrawal, as well as the work that went into collaborating with the Native American Tribes and leadership organizations. The Forest Service was a cooperating agency for the preparation of the Northern Arizona Proposed Withdrawal Environmental Impact Statement. The Bureau of Land Management was the lead agency and the Forest Service consented to the decision to implement the withdrawal. The Forest Service also values the protection of water quality and the importance of the outdoor economy in this area.

Executive Order 13783 required all executive agencies to review existing regulations, orders, policies, and other agency actions that potentially burden the development or use of domestically produced energy resources. The U.S. Department of the Interior Secretary is authorized to make, modify, extend, or revoke withdrawals on public or reserved Federal lands.

The recommendations included in the report you referenced in your query are for consideration and do not initiate a Federal action. Please see the enclosure for a detailed response to your questions.
